Never take for granted that your license IS what sets you apart from the underground economy. Your license IS your selling point to customers. You can offer your customers personal accountability that you will abide by industry standards and adhere to applicable building and safety laws. Your customers

can rest assured that you carry workers' compensation insurance

An industry without these standards, without people like YOU willing to go the extra mile to protect those in our communities, is like saying the underground economy should be the norm. Contractors devotes much of its energy to promoting the value of your license and educating the public about the protections that come with it.

Additionally, Board staff takes seriously its role in policing the underground economy and makes every effort to work with local district attorney's offices on the prosecution of those who repeatedly take advantage of those in our communities.

At the end of the day, our goals are similar. Protect our homes, protect our families, and protect our communities. Continue to educate your customers about the value of your license and promote the integrity of this industry that so greatly benefits the State of Nevada.







Sources of Complaints





Be a "card-carrying" licensed contractor

The Nevada State Contractors Board continuously reminds property owners to check contractors' pocket identification cards before agreeing to proposals, signing contracts or allowing anyone to perform work on their homes or businesses.

As these outreach efforts continue, NSCB also encourages all licensed contractors to carry the pocket cards while on the job and especially in situations where they think they might be soliciting business.

The hard plastic license pocket cards recently were redesigned to include NSCB's logo and the state seal in addition to the license number, business name, classification(s), and license expiration date. One card is issued upon issuance and renewal of the license. NSCB allows con-



Unlicensed person to pay restitution

Early in the quarter, the Washoe District Court convicted Austin Joseph Hayden on a gross misdemeanor charge of contracting without a license. Hayden, 33, received a one-year jail sentence, which was suspended in lieu of 14 days to be served and probation of up to three years. He will be required to pay more than \$47,500 in restitution to the victims and reimburse the Board for its investigative costs.

The Contractors Board filed charges against Hayden based on two investigations initiated by complaints filed by homeowners. Hayden had been previously investigated by the Board in 2008 after submitting a bid for painting and landscaping services to undercover NSCB investigators.

"The Board appreciates the Washoe County District Attor-

ney's office for convicting Mr. Hayden of crimes that have continually placed the public's safety at risk and ordering restitution to the victim involved," said NSCB Executive Officer Margi Grein. "It is becoming ever more important for homeowners to give consideration to

whom they are hiring; ensuring they are licensed by the Board affords homeowners our full investigative and remedial levels of protection."

Hayden is prohibited from engaging in any constructionrelated services while on probation for the next three years.

Anyone with information that any unlicensed contractor is advertising or soliciting such services is encouraged to contact the NSCB Unlicensed Contractor Hotline: (702) 486-1160 or (775) 850-7838. If available, include the unlicensed contractor's name, business address, project location, phone number and vehicle make, model, color and license plate number. When contracting for home repair and maintenance projects, always verify the contractor's license number on NSCB's website at www.nscb.nv.gov.

Two-year Board investigation leads to felony convictions

An extensive, two-year investigation by the Nevada State Contractors Board culminated in Nye County on Nov. 28, 2016 with the conviction and sentencing of Deanna Tovar for contracting without a license. Tovar, who had been previously convicted on similar felony charges, will spend at least 19 months in prison before becoming eligible for parole.

She pleaded guilty in Nye County District Court to three felony counts following the Board's investigation of six complaints, which were turned over to county District Attorney's office. Tovar received 48-month sentences on each count. Two sentences were suspended in lieu of five years' probation.

Tovar's sentence also included a \$1,500 fine and a restitution order of \$194,000 to the six homeowners.

Board investigators cited suspects for contracting without a license and/or illegally advertising construction services. Both are violations of Nevada Revised Statutes Chapter 624.

Board investigators also filed criminal complaints against three of those cited: George Tyler Szymoniac, Mark Hamilton and Heather Simbrat.

Investigators identified suspects through complaints to the Contractors Board and by examining advertisements on Craigslist and other bulletin board services. Under Nevada unlicensed individuals are not allowed to advertise to perform any construction, repair or maintenance work that requires a contractor's license. Nevada requires contractors to be licensed to perform any electrical, plumbing, heating or air conditioning work, any construction work that requires

a building permit and any project with a value of \$1,000 or more, including labor and materials. Suspects who submitted estimates for work in the prohibited trades or in excess of the \$1,000 ceiling received contracting without a license citations.

Officers from the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department assisted in the sting.

"The Contractors Board commends homeowners, licensed Nevada contractors and the law-enforcement community for their cooperation as we continue to work toward eliminating unlicensed activity, said NSCB Executive Officer Margi Grein. "Unlicensed con-

tractors are a potential danger to the safety and welfare of the community and undermine the confidence of the construction industry."

The Board encourages anyone who comes across unlicensed contracting activities to report the information to NSCB's Unlicensed Contractor Hotline: (702) 486-1160 or (775) 850-7838. Details to provide the Board, when available, include the unlicensed contractor's name, address (business and/or physical location where work is being performed), phone number, vehicle description, license plate, business card and/or advertisement, contracts signed by the unlicensed individual, etc.

Suspected "travelers" sought

The Nevada State Contractors Board has applied for arrest warrants for George Joe Delmaro and Sonny Paul Delmaro, who operate as Reliable Roofing and Paving in the Reno, Carson City and Lake Tahoe areas. The Board asked the Washoe County District Attorney to issue the warrants for misdemeanor contracting without a license and felony diversion of funds over \$1,000 against both

men. Sonny Delmaro's warrant request also contains a charge of providing false information to a law enforcement officer.

The Contractors Board alleges the Delmaros - who are also known by a string of aliases – are two of four people who have been accepting large down payments for construction projects, and then failing to provide any work or mate-This company carries no Nevada Contractors license and is not bonded in Nevada.

The men are considered to be travelers, driving from state to state operating constructionrelated scams, such as roofing and paving projects on unsuspecting homeowners, before taking their money, performing little or no work and moving on to the next community. The suspects are known to drive a gray Dodge Durango with an Arizona temporary registration number of 9D58530 and a black Ford F-150 pickup with Oklahoma plates 791LEC.

George Delmaro has used

the name Joe Delmaro. Sonny Delmaro is also known as David Stevens, Steven Stevens, David Delmaro, Pete Nicholas, John Austin, David Lee, Vincent Lee and David Page.

"Travelers are quick moving, settling in a community for a few days to take advantage of as many people as possible in a short timeframe before moving on to the next target area," explained NSCB Executive Officer Margi A. Grein. "The Board issued a Consumer Alert in late July, warning northern Nevada residents to beware of these individuals and Reliable Roofing and Paving. We remind homeowners to be wary if they receive unsolicited offers to perform home maintenance or repair services."

She said requests for cash payments or large down payments "too good to be true offers," high-pressure sales tactics and work vehicles without a valid Nevada contractor's license number displayed should set off alarm bells.

Board revokes, fines licenses

The Nevada State Contractors Board took action against several licensed contractors for violations of Nevada Revised Statutes Chapter 624 during its October, November and December hearings in Reno and Henderson.

Mountain West Electric, license number 71877 (electrical), based out of Las Vegas, Nev., was found in violation for abandonment of a construction project, failure to comply with the terms of a contract, failure to maintain industrial insurance, failure to establish financial responsibility, failure to possess another license required by the state and failure to notify the Board of a change in address or personnel. The license was revoked. Licensee was fined \$3,850 and assessed investigative costs.

Western Iron Enterprises, dba Boys of Nevada, license number 73860 (structural steel, ornamental metal, awnings and louvres), based out of Las Vegas, Nev., was found in violation for abandonment of a construction project, diversion of funds, failure to notify the Board of a change in address or personnel, failure to include the license number or monetary limit on a bid or contract, failure to include Residential Recovery Fund information on a contract, contracting on a suspended or revoked license, failure to establish financial responsibility and failure to comply with the terms of a contract and failure to comply with a request from the Board. The license was revoked. Licensee was fined \$4,250 and assessed investigative costs.

Alternative Drilling Company, LLC, license number 73955 (well drilling, pump installation, pressure tanks), based out of Spring Creek, Nev., was found in violation for abandonment of a construction project, diversion of funds, failure to comply with a notice to correct, failure to respond to a request from the Board, failure to include Residential Recovery Fund information on a contract and failure to establish financial responsibility. The license was revoked.

Licensee was fined \$6,000 and assessed investigative costs.

Second Generation Builders, Inc., license numbers 58141A (residential and small commercial) and 72713 (plumbing) based out of Carson City, Nev., was found in violation for failure to establish financial responsibility, failure to keep in force a bond or cash deposit, failure to include Residential Recovery Fund information on a contract, contracting beyond the scope of the license and failure to ensure all bidders are properly licensed. The license was revoked. Licensee was fined \$2,400 and assessed investigative costs.

Palmetto Construction, license number 68528 (general building), based out of North Las Vegas, Nev., was found in violation for failure to establish financial responsibility, failure to include the license number or monetary limit on a bid or contract and failure to cooperate in the investigation of a complaint. The license was revoked.

Clark County Builders, LLC., license number 77092 (residential and small commercial), based out of Henderson, Nev., was found in violation for abandonment of a construction project, failure to comply with the terms of a contract, failure to maintain industrial insurance, failure to comply with a notice to correct and committing a fraudulent or deceitful act. The license was revoked. Licensee was fined \$10,500 and assessed investigative costs.

Edward Monroe Olson, dba B.O.A. Construction, license number 69631 (carpentry), based out of Boulder City, Nev., was found in violation for disregard of the state's building laws, failure to establish financial responsibility, failure to include the license number or monetary limit on a bid or contract, failure to include

Residential Recovery Fund information in a bid or contract, contracting beyond the scope of the license, bidding in excess of the license's monetary limit, substandard workmanship, failure to respond to and comply with a request from the Board. The license was revoked. Licensee was fined \$4,200 and assessed investigative costs.

Whiteford Grading and Paving, Inc., license number 69595 (highways, sealing and striping impermeable paving, recycling asphalt, excavating, grading, trenching and surfacing, wrecking buildings, paving streets, driveways and parking lots), based out of North Las Vegas, Nev., was found in violation for disregard of the state's building laws, failure to pay for materials or services, failure to establish financial responsibility, failure to comply with the provisions of the Board, committing a fraudulent or deceitful act, failure to cooperate in an investigation and failure to comply with a request for information. The license was suspended. Licensee was fined \$6,500 and assessed investigative costs.

A&T Construction, LLC, dba A&T Construction and Hospitality, license numbers 79275 (finishing floors), 79276 (painting and decorating), 79277 (carpentry) and 79278 (tiling) and Hotel Renovations, LLC, license numbers 79711 (finishing floors), 79712 (carpentry), 79713 (painting and decorating) and 79714 (tiling), based out of Las Vegas, Nev., were found in violation for failure to establish financial responsibility, failure to notify the Board of a change in address or personnel and failure to comply with a request from the Board. The licenses were revoked. Licensees were fined \$1,750 and assessed investigative costs.

Ability Heating and Air, Inc., license number 78959 (refrigeration and air conditioning), based out of Las Vegas, Nev., was found in violation for failure to establish financial responsibility, failure to keep in force a bond or cash deposit, failure to notify the Board of a change in address or personnel and contracting on a sus-

pended or revoked license. The license was revoked. Licensee was fined \$4,000 and assessed investigative costs.

Emilo Ortiz, dba Hoffman Plumbing, license number 33558 (plumbing), based out of Carson City, Nev., was found in violation for misrepresentation of a material fact. Licensee was fined \$500 and assesses investigative costs.

A.M.O. Electric, license number 72917 (electrical) and U.S. Renewable Energy Development, LLC, 75882 (electrical), based out of Las Vegas, was instructed to provide the Board a current compliant financial statement in support of current license limits. License number 75882 was suspended pending the submittal.

T.L. Townsend Builders, LLC, dba Townco Construction Group, license number 79651, based out of Las Vegas, Nev., was found in violation of Nevada building laws and failure to include the license number or monetary limit on a bid or contract. Licensee was fined \$1,600 and assessed investigative costs.

Reno Renovators, license number 49501 (carpentry) based out of Reno, Nev., was found in violation for abandonment of a construction project and failure to establish financial responsibility. The license was revoked.

V.F. & I., Inc., license number 76243 (carpentry), V.F. & I., Inc., dba V.F. & I., Inc., license numbers 76240 (finishing floors), 76241 (tiling) and 76242 (installing terrazzo and marble), and V.F. & I., Inc., dba Vegas Remodeling, license number 80964 (residential and small commercial), based out of Las Vegas, Nev., was found in violation for aiding or abetting an unlicensed person, conspiring with an unlicensed person to perform an unauthorized act, allowing a license to be used by an unlicensed person and acting as an agent, partner or associate of an unlicensed person. Licensee was fined \$18,000 and assessed investigative costs. The limit on license number 80964 was reduced to \$420,000.

Board enforcement & contractor complaince

Every day, the Board receives and investigates complaints against licensed contractors; 1,756 complaints against licensed contractors in 2016 to be exact.

Every case is investigated on its own merit, and every outcome varies. Some cases are closed invalid. Others can result in an administrative citation or a contractor being ordered to correct workmanship issues, which many do.

Did you know a complaint is not part of a licensee's public record unless it's referred for disciplinary action? Participating in the investigative process and making every effort to comply with the Board's orders can help you as a contractor maintain a clear public record.

In addition to the tips outlined in this article, there are other resources the Board offers contractors to help you in your day-to-day operations.

For instance, if you want to know whether your license allows you to perform certain work, you can e-mail the detailed scope of work to Board staff. Staff will review the material and provide you with a written response.

Additionally, if there is a project that exceeds the value of your monetary limit, you can apply for a one-time limit increase - or a permanent increase if you plan on bidding more projects of a similar size.

You can request up to five one-time limit increases per year. Just remember that every time you do, you will have to provide an updated financial statement to ensure you have the wherewithal to support the higher limit. It's important to note, however, that you cannot bid the project UNTIL you receive approval from the Board that your limit is increased. Additionally, your request MUST be submitted at least five working days prior to the bid. Submitting these requests concurrently will undoubtedly get you in trouble!

Some of the main violations we see can easily be prevented by following these tips:

Ensure all advertising, signage, bid forms, and other paperwork identifies your business the same way it is listed with the Contractors Board, including your license number and monetary limit.

Obtain permits before beginning work. For after-hours and weekend emergency work, apply for the permit the next business day.

For residential contractors, make sure you provide homeowners with the Residential Recovery Fund information. Having them initial it, while not required, would further demonstrate your effort to make homeowners aware of their rights.

Do not bid over your limit

or outside the scope of your license. Remember, change orders are not separate. The Board looks at these collectively, so give yourself a little room to make adjustments.

Not a violation, just a tip! Document everything! This is just as important for you as it is homeowners. Ensure your contracts are details, you have change orders in writing, and keep a copy of payments and receipts.

At the end of the day, it is your responsibility to ensure you and your staff are informed of and complying with the requirements of being a license holder. So give the Board a call with any questions or concerns you have prior to them becoming an issue. We'll do our best to point you in the right direction or give you the information needed to make an informed decision.



About our veterans assistance program

In response to an order by Governor Brian Sandoval, the Nevada State Contractors Board has identified more ways to more quickly and efficiently serve military veteran contractor applicants. The Board requests and tracks the number of veteran contractors it serves.

During the quarter, staff prepared and submitted the annual report to the Interagency Council on Veterans Affairs noting that 80 licensees disclosed Veteran status with their renewal application.

The new initiative is under-

taken in addition to the Board's Military Assistance Program that aims to ease the transition from active-duty military to civilian contractor.

Also available to the spouses of active-duty personnel, the program assigns a dedicated Board staff member to veterans' applications. The goal is to ensure that veterans receive proper credit for construction-related work they perform in the military and these duties are fully applied to the applicant's work experience requirements.

Also, as military spouses

often move frequently while following their husband's or wife's military career, they face extraordinary challenges in plying their construction trade and establishing a business. The Board makes a special effort to ensure spouses' out-of-state work histories warrant the waiver of certain experience requirements for licensure.



Nevada Contractor's Checklist

The following information is provided to help Nevada Contractors work within the law. | Always make sure license number and monetary limit is on all contracts or bids. NAC 624.640(5) |

| Check to ensure that licenses or persons with whom you contract are valid and active. NAC 624.650 |
| Be sure name of business under which contractor is contracting is the same as the li- cense number. NRS 624.305 |
| Be sure the amount of the bid or contract is within the monetary limit of the contractor. NRS 624.3015(2) |
| Be sure that the contract is within the scope of work/license classification. NRS 6243015(3) |
| Know what you are contracting for, verify terms of the contract, and comply with terms of the contract. NRS 624.3013(1) |
| If it is not in your written contract, it doesn't exist. Make sure all change orders are in writ- ing and signed by all parties. NRS 624.3013(1) |
| Include Residential Recovery Fund Disclosure on all residential contracts. NRS 624.520 |
| Provide customers with required Notice to Owner Disclosure, NRS 624.600(1)(2) and (3) as described in NAC 624.693 & NAC 624.6932 |
| Make sure your license number is on all business advertisements, including vehicles, business cards, letterhead, signage, directories, newspapers, website, etc. NRS 624.720 |
| Always make sure license number and monetary limit is on all contracts or bids. NAC 624.640(5) |
| Your license number should be approximately 1 1/2 inches on your motor vehicle. NRS 624.288 |
| If your address or other pertinent information about the business changes, notify Contractors Board in writing within 30 days. NAC 624.640(3) |
